- **The Jazz Loft Project: W. Eugene Smith in New York City, 1957-1965** provides an in-depth examination of the photographer W. Eugene Smith's unique documentation of American jazz culture in mid-twentieth-century New York. The exhibition includes 150 photographs as well as ephemera and archival materials, listening and video stations.
- **Building the Contemporary Collection: Five Years of Acquisitions** is an installation of contemporary works acquired since the Nasher Museum's founding. Most of the artists are living and have achieved global reputations; some are emerging and others represent the museum's interest in the art and culture of the African diaspora. The exhibition will include works in a variety of media—painting, photography, sculpture and video—by more than 25 artists.
- Jaume Plensa's **Glückauf?** is iron letters that make up the strands of a curtain, vertically strung in the front of the Nasher Museum's permanent collection gallery. The letters spell out the text of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.
- **Body of Christ** is an installation featuring four works by contemporary Spanish artist Javier Pérez. Pérez's works are placed within the historical context of paintings and sculptures of the Crucifixion from the 12th through the 18th centuries in the Nasher Museum's permanent collection. Works range from bloody depictions of the tortured body of Christ to Crucifixes showing Christ with his eyes open, a Christ triumphant over death.
